have a voice, if not the foremost voice, in the perpetual stewardship of the land, and in the planning of our communities. Our voices should be credible, expressed frequently, amplified through our own unity and echoed by our allies. Therefore, our voices should always be impactful throughout society. AIA is a means to that end.

Two thousand ten has certainly been a trying year for architects, as have the previous years, due to the economy. However, even during economic turndowns we are no less talented, no less concerned, and no less important. We simply are not in total, prevailing control, thus we must endure the storms of the economy. And we will. We just need to always remember that if it is not a time of harvest, then it is a serious seed planting and/or cultivating time! There are things we can all do to ultimately put ourselves at a greater level of control and influence. AIA is a means to that end.

AIA Illinois has long been a source of advocacy for architects and architectural practices. My 2010 administrative focus as president has been on leveraging the following: empowerment, visibility and engagement.

These areas of focus collectively are all about Unifying Architects to Operate from a Position of Strength, a slogan I have promoted throughout the year to go along with the national AIA slogan, Design Matters! The unity I speak of no doubt takes some level of external engagement, outside of the daily practice life in the office. AIA and its staff work behind the scenes every day, but the more energy and participation we all give, the greater the harvest we all experience.

We were able to taste some success, through our unity and external engagement, several times in 2010. In February, several AIA Illinois members traveled to Washington, DC, carrying clever, graphically-illustrated messages reminding our national congressional leaders that design matters and requesting their support on five key legislative issues. These issues ranged from unfreezing credit to allow more development, to relief for small businesses, to green building tax deductions. In March, very similar issues were taken to the General Assembly in Springfield by a much larger group of about 90 AIA Illinois representatives. This effort led to legislative advancements toward adopting a green building labeling system in Illinois, similar to the Energy Star labeling for appliances. April saw a number of Architecture Week activities around the state, increasing awareness of architects and their work.

Of course, near and dear to my heart throughout the year are those who met my President's Challenge, an initiative calling for all architects in the state to frame the understanding of architecture and the role of architects in society by visiting young students in their schools at least once during each calendar year. (i.e., career days, guest lectures, craft projects, Architecture Week visits, Junior Achievement programs, etc). Thanks very much to all who have participated and by all means please do it again, you will enjoy it each time.

If you missed out on any or all of these initiatives and activities, the future holds opportunities for you to join in and elevate our profession.

In closing, I will offer my belief that architecture is practiced to its fullest when it includes some form of leadership in the communities. In the words of John Quincy Adams, "If your actions inspire others to dream more, to learn more, to do more and to become more. . . . You are a leader!" Let us all continue to be great architects and leaders in the community.

here's no better way to ensure a brighter future than to become a role model for the next generation. This year kicked off with the President's Challenge that encouraged members — from principals to interns — to visit a nearby school and share their experiences with oung people in the community. Through this thoughtful giving of me, students from throughout the state learned the important role hat architects plays in our society. For some, it may have even planted e seed that will lead them to a career in architecture.

On the legislative front, the New Year saw the enactment of the Energy Efficient Building Act. Signed into law the previous summer, this important bill amends and renames the Energy Efficient Commercial Building Act to include residential buildings. We were a key supporter of the bill: "Since residential buildings represent the biggest share of everything built, bringing homes into these efficiency standards is great news with lots of positive results to come. AIA Illinois s very proud to support this long-term and well-fought effort," Executive Vice President Mike Waldinger told reporters.

n our ongoing effort to provide new and more efficient channels of ommunication, we created a Facebook page to provide regular uplates on AIA Illinois activities, and to share industry news and other relevant information. Members are encouraged to follow us on Facebook and provide feedback. You can also network with other nembers and initiate discussions by joining our LinkedIn group.

Throughout society and across the globe, social media is playing an increasingly important role in how we communicate and share information. AIA Illinois will continue to explore new ways to bring our members closer together.



Our members, almost 100 strong, descended upon the state capitol for the Prairie Grassroots Conference. There, they added their voices to the legislative debate on issues that effect our work, our lives and our communities. AIA Illinois ensures that we have a place at the table throughout the year by monitoring activity and advocating for bills that will positively effect our profession. This conference gives weight to our daily efforts and we appreciate your support.

Senator William R. Haine of Alton was selected as Legislator of the Year for his support and sponsorship of a bill that amended the Illinois Architecture Practice Act. The act, first passed in 1897, was to sunset in 2009. With Senator Haine's leadership and the contribution of many concerned parties, we were able to build a consensus on a list of amendments that adapt to changes in the industry, while maintaining the act's original intent of protecting the health, safety and welfare of the public.






CROMBIE TAYLOR AWARD

National Architecture Week was held April 12 to the 18. In Illinois, the theme for 2010 was "7 Days . . . 7 Ways." Members were encouraged to increase awareness of their profession by engaging in the following activities: soliciting media coverage, presenting public presentations, supporting community organizations, visiting schools, hosting open houses, seeking government proclamations recognizing Architecture Week, and displaying public kiosks that celebrate architecture. Through your participation, people have a better understanding of the essential role architecture plays in their daily lives.

By a unanimous vote, a bill amending the Capital Development Board Act passed the Illinois House of Representatives, after previously passing with a 56-0 vote in the Senate. The bill establishes a pilot energy-per-foot measurement for buildings, similar to the miles-per-gallon information required of automobiles. AIA Illinois wrote the bill and worked on its behalf as it made its way to the governor's desk, where it was signed into law on May 24.





The AIA 2010 National Convention and Design Exposition was held in beautiful Miami. As a new decade unfolds, the "Design as Exploration" theme encouraged members to view the traditional ways they practice architecture in a new light.
